**Title** Example Junction Count data for use with JunctionSeq

**Depends** R (>= 3.3)

**Description** Junction count data from an example dataset taken from a subset of the RNA-seq reads from six samples. Data was subsampled and modified to provide edge cases for testing and to reduce file sizes.

The original dataset had 24 samples which were multiplexed and sequenced across 6 lanes. Only 6 of those samples were selected for use in this example dataset, and only the first three lanes were used. In addition, only chromosome 14 was included in its entirety. We also included a small number of genes randomly from chromosomes 15, X, and M.

A number of minor modifications were made to the dataset to provide artificial edge cases for code testing.

The fullExampleDataSet dataset contains 14851 counting bins, 11365 of which are testable (ie. nonzero). Of these, 6154 are exonic regions, 5072 are known splice junctions, and 139 are novel splice junctions.

The exampleDataSet dataset is cut down even further to provide an extremely small dataset for testing purposes. It contains 1464 counting bins, 1103 of which are testable (ie. nonzero). Of these, 600 are exonic regions, 492 are known splice junctions, and 11 are novel splice junctions. These features span 58 genes.

NONE of these datasets are intended to be representative of the original data.
